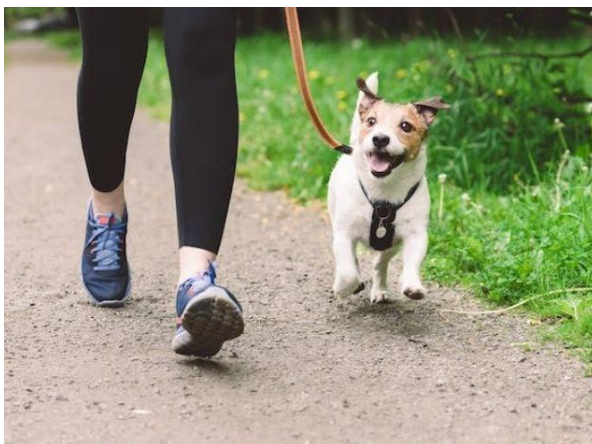

APD Crime Prevention Unit Seeks Feedback on Proposed Dog Walker Watch Program

The Albuquerque Police Department's (APD) Crime Prevention Unit is considering starting a Dog Walker Watch Program and seeks feedback from residents on this suggested idea. Dog Walker Watch is a crime prevention and awareness program, similar to Neighborhood Watch, that encourages neighbors out walking their dogs to be extra "eyes and ears" for law enforcement. Dog owners and walkers are trained on how to effectively observe and report suspicious behavior, while enhancing the partnership between the police and community. If you haven't yet gotten your REAL ID, the deadline is coming up on May 7, 2025. A REAL ID is needed to enter certain federal facilities, to board federally regulated commercial aircraft, and to enter nuclear power plants. A neighborhood association is a group of residents from a particular area who organize to improve their neighborhoods by addressing local concerns, advocating for neighborhood needs, and fostering a sense of community through events and initiatives, essentially acting as a unified voice to represent their neighborhood to local government and other stakeholders.

Key functions of a neighborhood association:

- **Raising awareness of local issues:**

Identifying problems like crime, infrastructure concerns, or environmental issues within the neighborhood.

- **Advocating for change:**

Communicating neighborhood concerns to local authorities and decision-makers to push for solutions.

- **Community building:**

Organizing social events like block parties, clean-ups, and neighborhood watch programs to foster connections between residents.

- **Maintaining property values:**

Working to preserve the aesthetic appeal and character of the neighborhood.

- **Providing information:**

Sharing updates on local developments and important information with residents.

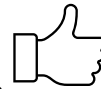
